Dear Prime Minister

Shires of Laverton and Leonora Western Australia - Cashless Debit Card

It is with mixed feelings that I must write to you on the current situation within the Shires of Laverton and Leonora.

Please find an outline of what is required to ensure the Shires of Laverton and Leonora can action internally to overcome issues that, from a community perspective, have arisen from the withdrawal of the Cashless Debit Card from these communities. As the Shire President for Laverton, I write this from a perspective that is predominantly of my own district, however both Laverton and Leonora are experiencing the same issues and we do mirror each other in the perspective and needs of each of our separate communities.

In opening, I need to clear the air on a matter which involves your Assistant Minister, the Hon Justine Elliott MP who made a personal disparaging comment on my voicing a contrary opinion on the Cashless Debit Card. The semantics of the card can be left to others as your government has made the decision to withdraw the card and I fully understand your election promise. The consultation however, could have been better handled as when the Assistant Minister Justine Elliott MP visited Leonora WA, it was a fait accompli of the withdrawal, and the consultation was called a farce by those present from local government.

To get the information correct, it is important, and knowing you understand heritage extremely well, it's important to know that my heritage is in Laverton with 5 generations of my family living within Laverton now. This is my home and I call on you with your sense of fair play to seek an apology from the Assistant Minister. I have lived here for 66 years and have seen the town go through the ups and downs with mining and the transition before and after the Cashless Debit Card.

I will leave this with you to address with your Assistant Minister.

I called upon you in a recent radio interview to seek an apology from the Assistant Minister for referring to me as disingenuous. The following is an extract from the aforementioned radio interview with the morning show announce Mr Ivo da Silva from ABC Goldfields Radio, which aired on Tuesday 14th February, 2023.

ABC Goldfields Esperance with Ivo da Silva



Ivo da Silva: Many community leaders in the Goldfields have expressed their disappointment at the withdrawal of the cashless debit card. Shire of Laverton President Patrick Hill has been very vocal in this, saying people in Canberra who make these decisions don't know what it is on the ground, and they make these decisions without having the understanding of what it means to have that cashless debit card removed and the non-voluntary aspect that people had to be on it. What's your message to Pat Hill who is really critical of your government's decision to remove it?

Minister Justine Elliott: Look I'd really like to work with everyone in the community in terms of getting outcomes here. I think it's unfortunate that some of those people who are being critical that what they are saying is disingenuous and wrong.

We all know there are whole series' of very complex challenges in many communities, and many of those challenges were there well before the cashless debit card came into force, and those challenges are its just now and I think its simplistic and disingenuous of some of the claims that are being made and I think it really does undermine the broader approach that everyone is taking in terms of trying to get better outcomes for these communities where we know there are challenges so I say to many of those people work with us to get outcomes. I don't think this is the time for play what I would say is cheap political game (or blame). This is about providing support for communities that is needed and have sometimes have very complex issues that we should be dealing with together in terms of providing that support.

Ivo da Silva: The Shire President Pat Hill has said has been critical he's lived it before during and now after he is on record saying the violence the alcohol abuse decreased during the cashless debit card and now that it's been removed we've seen first-hand as well about the violence that is up there. Are you saying he is being disingenuous with his comments?

Minister Justine Elliott: Well, I am because I think as I said there are many complex matters that come to play in these situations and many people on the ground told me that having the cashless debit card didn't actually make that much of a difference. There were many ways it was not effective at all I think it a quite a simplistic political attack that people are making, and I think it's wrong and unfair to those communities that deserve the support of all levels of government to get it outcome what we know a lot of these issues have been in place for a while. We want to work with everyone in the community, all levels of government to get an outcome and I would ask those people to put aside their political vibes if you like and work with everyone in terms of getting outcomes. It's about providing a better future to the people of these communities. That's what important."

The real crux of this letter to you is to seek your assistance. Assistance to not only enhance the welfare of indigenous peoples within the districts of Laverton and Leonora but also to enhance the welfare of the transient population coming into these communities from the Ngaanyatjarra lands (The Lands) an area that makes up approximately 3% of mainland



Australia and adjoining the Northern Territory and South Australian borders, as well as other surrounding Councils. Geographically, Laverton is the first town from The Lands and provides a conduit to other towns on the way to Kalgoorlie-Boulder (358 kilometres form Laverton), the Regional Centre for the Goldfields.

The mining industry is blossoming within Laverton and Leonora and to present a picture for you, the following is the value of minerals from within the Goldfields-Esperance Region of Western Australia which Laverton heads and Leonora seconds.

The employees in mining 2021-2022 (not including exploration, railways, and petroleum) are:

Laverton: 7776 or 6954 full time equivalent.
 Leonora: 5889 or 5336 full time equivalent

The Royalty Receipts from Goldfields-Esperance Region are: \$479.87 million.

Based on 28.50% of the value of the Goldfields-Esperance Region, Laverton contributes \$136.76 million, and Leonora \$89.25 million at 18.60% to the Western Australian government. This is a straight-line method and used as an example of the contributions to the state.

This will be further enhanced by the expansion of Lynas Rare Earths, as it all starts from the mine some 30 kilometres from the Laverton townsite. Lynas along with all the mining companies in the shire support Laverton and Leonora as the relationships are committed to making life better for all residents and visitors to Laverton and Leonora as they expand their operations. The opportunities for employment are many and varied and the fundamental aspect of education of indigenous people needs to be tailored to meet their cultural sensitivities and to also meet the requirements of mining and other industries.



The council fully understands that the state government has competing priorities for funding, however, as it will become clear in the Council's proposal below, the input from the State and Commonwealth would be considered minor when compared to the anticipated results. The combined input from the State and the Commonwealth would reduce the financial stress on either party, and would allow the local community the opportunity to take control of its own destiny. Further, this strategy parallels the recent announcement in the Northern Territory to improve community safety, tackle alcohol-related harm, and provide more opportunities for young people to continue to work with the community on longer-term solutions to the issues the communities are facing.

As experts and community leaders have pointed out, alcohol restrictions alone will not address the underlying causes of antisocial behaviour. The issues present within these communities are complex and have developed over decades. The Councils believe that all Australians should and must be treated the same to ensure consistency of thought and consequences amongst all. To excuse one over another can only lead to disorder as most people understand the consistency of law and abide accordingly.

To address the decline in services and investment over the last decade in particular, the Shires of Laverton and Leonora are seeking that the Australian Government and the West Australian Government invest \$81 million in a plan for A Better, Safer Future for Laverton and Leonora. The principles outlines in the National Indigenous Australians Agency documentation is the reference point for the following information.

This plan will focus on the following for both Laverton and Leonora, with a dollar value placed at the end of the dialogue for each category:

- 1. Improved Community Safety and Cohesion through more youth engagement and diversion programs. The council operates through two youth officers and is wanting to engage further to enhance the essentials of life to the youth which range up to 25 years of age. Laverton is ably supported through sporting activities, by the Stephen Michael foundation and Shooting Stars for girls, however, the education of youth is critical especially when the home life is difficult. The state provides funding to support the council and the youth program needs to be expanded upon at a critical level. The basics of life and the culture in a divided world where neither appears to be doing justice.
- Job Creation particularly in the Laverton and the influx from the Lands with opportunities as follows:
 - a. Mining Industry as can be seen the statistics are heavily weighted to the mining industry and the mining companies are only too willing to provide opportunities for all Australians. Of course, the production schedules for mines must be met and the commitment from all to be involved.
 - b. Great Central Rd There are opportunities for the involvement of both construction and maintenance activities over the length of road contained within Western Australia. This is a local road owned by the Laverton Shire to the Ngaanyatjarra Lands border. This will be further enhanced with expected flood damage to the road as weather patterns change.
 - c. Laverton and Leonora Shire Councils There are opportunities as the Council is proactive in trying to engage indigenous employees to take on various roles, including, administration, pool, roadworks, information centre, airport, etc.



- d. Local contractors they are always looking for staff to live locally and attract
 to and retain staff in the town.
- e. Training the Council has two training providers in town and the school should/must introduce a manual arts program to enhance the practically of the education and employment opportunities.
- 3. Better Services by improving health services such as the building of the Laverton Hospital which the Council appreciates the Premier getting involved in seeing the way clear to send the project to tender. Laverton Council has worked closely with the state government in the building of the new aquatic centre, information centre and recent funding to assist in the construction of a new airport terminal.

The Council is committed to engage with the Pakaanu Aboriginal Corporation now and well into the future as programs move forward together as a community.

The Commonwealth Government made an election promise to provide \$800k to the building of an indigenous camp to house itinerant people coming into Laverton. Whilst the commitment is appreciated, there is so much more required to accommodate and ensure that families can be together in a safe and complete environment. The issue as always, is that the Council can build anything and it is not the capital cost, it is the maintenance. Therefore, a further allocation is required to secure and extend the camp along with the extension to the One-Tree facility where women and children can be housed safely if there is a real threat.

The aim would be to house staff to better serve the towns of Laverton and Leonora and beyond and prevent the constant drive-in drive-out mentality where little is achieved. Community health requires people on the ground to achieve and assist in changing the current plight of locals and visitors alike.

4. Alcohol - Preventing and addressing the issues caused by Alcohol including better responding through the health and justice systems. The Police require a clear direction from governments as this is a state responsibility and to bolster the numbers is appropriate as Laverton through the Goldfields region looks after outlying villages. The issue is the attraction of staff and the available government housing. The council is keen to build and maintain homes and then lease them back to government employees so they can support the initiatives as without staff on the ground, it is doomed for failure.

All Australians should be treated the same and not one rule for indigenous members of the community and one for everyone else. I can imagine those sitting in the leafy western suburbs of WA and the Eastern suburbs of the East Coast being aghast with this comment, however this is the reality in the outback.

5. Investing in Families – This is a critical investment and includes better support for elders and parents and boosting domestic violence services. Accommodation should be provided to those who deserve a home as their record depicts that they are responsible. There are so many homes in Laverton and Leonora boarded up by the Department of Communities and just not available as families sleep rough. What is required is housing as a place to call home. The importance of grandparents to the indigenous culture is



massive and to support these grandparents in looking after their grandkids must not go unrewarded. The pressure they must feel is something we can only imagine as they try to keep everything together.

On-Country Learning/Education – improving school attendance and completion
through caring for culture and country. This is the critical element and to allow children
to not be afforded an opportunity to attend school is criminal and unfortunately in later
life, the truth and reality comes to the fore. The solution is to employee staff to ensure
that children are at school.

A mining company supports the school with the feeding of the children who attend school, and the council took up this mantle during the recent Christmas/New Year holiday break to ensure that the kids were fed and not have to break in to get a feed. This was a joint initiative by the Police, Pakaanu Aboriginal Corporation, mining, and the Council.

The Shire of Laverton and Leonora are keen to provide a business plan, and this will be ably supported by the mining industry in providing expertise to build up the plan. However, in the first instance, we have used a "broad brush" approach, which can be summarised to the 6 areas mentioned to ensure that opportunities are presented to all Australians.

Application of a black hot-pour crack sealant was undertaken on town street footpaths week commencing Monday 27 February 2023, and completed on Thursday 2 March 2023. This is getting ready for the resealing of the footpaths at the same time of the Town Street reseal program.

Construction of Council Road works have been outsourced to a local contractor Desert Sands and the following works will be undertaken.

- Old Laverton Rd
 Construct cement stabilised gravel floodway approximately 6.25km from town, application hot bitumen spray seal existing road width between Laverton Bypass for 6.36km road length.
- 2. Hawkes Place between Phoenix St and Tempest St



Remove existing unsuitable road base material, top up with fresh gravel, application hot bitumen spray seal

3. Stuart Pea Dr

Widen both shoulders, application hot bitumen spray seal 10.0m seal width between Leonora-Laverton Rd and Great Central Rd

4 Sullivan Rd

Widen both shoulders, application hot bitumen spray seal 7.4m seal width between Great Central Rd and airport carpark.

5. Rubbish Tip Rd

Reconstruct existing gravel road, application hot bitumen spray seal 7.4m width between Laverton Bypass and tip entrance.

6. Crawford St

Widen both shoulders, application hot bitumen spray seal 9.0m width between Leonora-Layerton Rd and Cox St

7 Cox St

Widen both shoulders, application hot bitumen spray seal 9.0m width between Leonora-Laverton Rd and Weld Dr

8. Bandya Rd

Re-gravel from end of seal Lancefield Diversion Rd intersection for 6.0km road length

Construction jobs will be controlled by temporary road traffic signage and traffic controllers for safety of road users and road crew.

Public are asked to abide by all road signage and directions given by traffic controllers.

The following sealing program will commence on the 26th April 2023.



CR SHANEANE WELDON

DEPUTY PRESIDENT, SHIRE OF LAVERTON

WHAT IS YOUR 'DAY JOB' AND HOW DOES IT RELATE TO YOUR ROLE AS A COUNCILLOR?

My day job is basically working for my own company, which allows me the flexibility to sit on a few boards and of course the Shire of Laverton. I often relate my experience as a director to my role as a Councillor on the Laverton Shire. As a Shire Councillor, the experience I have gained has given me the experience to share with these other boards. It's about making shared decisions that positively impact the wider community. Reflecting on my role as both a self-employed person, and as a Councillor, it is important to not only have the necessary skills for good governance, which also includes strategic planning and financial management, but to also have commitment and dedication to your role. This includes reading agendas and reports, having the information, so that we can make good sound decisions for good outcomes.

WHAT SPURRED YOU ON TO RUN FOR COUNCIL?

I felt like getting involved with the Shire and being part of the decision making for whatever's going on in town. Also being an Indigenous person, I felt like the Council needed to hear directly from an Indigenous person and what our perspective is rather than the Council making decisions for the people without their input.

HOW HAS LOCAL GOVERNMENT CHANGED OVER THE YEARS?

One of the first changes at a local level I saw was the abolishing of the ward system in our Council. There used to be a Country ward and Town ward. Other changes is that there is more engagement and interaction with other Local Governments in the region as opposed to say 20 years ago. I also believe that there are more female Councillors on Councils which is a huge change in terms of gender equality, and more Aboriginal people are getting on Council. The increased diversity among Elected Members is a good change.

WHAT ARE SOME OF THE BIGGEST CHALLENGES YOU HAVE FACED IN YOUR TIME ON COUNCIL?

I guess explaining things from a cultural perspective and giving Council background information, so a better understanding is shared before making decisions. Understanding reports and understanding and keeping up with changes in policies and departments has also been a challenge. I have often challenged other community people to put their hand up and stand for Council, with lots of support and encouragement.

WHAT DOES A GOOD WEEKEND LOOK LIKE IN LAVERTON FOR YOU?

When my children were smaller, I used to love taking them to the swimming pool. Novadays, I take my grandchildren to the pool for a cool down. A good start to the weekend in Laverton begins with a nice cup of coffee at the Great Beyond where you usually bump into the locals for a catch up, and usually a meal at the local pub is another way to catch up with visitors to town or the locals who you don't see during the week. I have a tow relatives in town, so now and then we would go out bush and spend time on country.

WHAT ARE SOME OF THE BENEFITS OF LIVING IN THE REGION?

The benefits are there's no traffic or traffic lights, except when you're out on the main road to Kaigcorile and passing huge trucks travelling back and forth to the mines. You get to know everyone and everything, and you get to know and understand the issues on a better level.

AND CHALLENGES OF LIFE IN THE REGION?

The biggest challenge living in the north-east Goldfields is the distance from your main provincial town with the services. People living out here depend on some of these services which visit on a monthly basis, if residents don't have their own vehicle for transport, then they must rely on a weekly bus service. People have to plan trips whether it be medical or personal, to coincide with other business, so that the trip to these main towns or the city is organised to get as much done as possible to make the trip worthwhile.

The other major challenge is food shopping. With the cost of living on the rise all over Australia, take a step back and double or triple that cost in remote areas such as here. The price of food is astronomical. And again, if you haven't got the transport to travel to the main town for a weekly shopping trip, you have no choice but to buy local. You have to think about how you're going to transport this food back, the space, and you need to keep it cool or frozen. A simple shopping trip can become a full-on project.

You have to take into account, the cost of fuel, opening hours of fuel outlets, be prepared for vehicle breakdowns, and communication. There are black spots for communication throughout the whole region. You cannot assume you will have mobile coverage 100 per cent of the time.

Travelling in remote areas, is one of the biggest challenges facing anyone. If people are planning to travel on unsealed roads they need to travel according to the conditions of the road, be prepared for any form of breakdown, and most importantly let people know where you are travelling. If you're going to travel at night, be aware that there are properties with unfenced boundaries near the roads, which involves watching out for wandering stock on roads, not to mention the roos.

WHAT IS YOUR PROUDEST ACHIEVEMENT TO DATE AS A COUNCIL LOR?

There's been many, but to mention a few, I must say the proudest would be having the Aboriginal flag flown outside the Shire office, and having our Aboriginal language under the English wording, on the welcome and exit signs at each of the town entrances. The town upgrade is definitely one of the highlights, which includes the building of a new pool compound on the same site, and the extension of the Great Beyond Centre. There is a lot of changes that has happened to this wonderful little town over the years, and I am proud to say that for the past 16 years, I have been a part of that.

WHAT ADVICE DO YOU HAVE FOR SOMEONE THINKING OF RUNNING FOR COUNCIL?

Anyone who is passionate about their town and the issues, please join Local Government and be a part of the change in your community. It's not okey to sit back, talk, and criticise what Council is doing. Put your hand up and have a go and be a part of the decision making. Don't be intimidated by the people around the table, gain your confidence and speak the truth for what you believe to be the best for the community. You can't go in with the view of what you can personally get out of it. No, you must always have the best interest of the community in your heart and soul. Another good advice is to speak to the current Councillors to get an understanding of the role and get to know the background of the Shire as to what it entails, the landscape of the region. the local issues impacting services for the residents and also have a vision for the future. It is a great experience, and there's so much to learn and be a part of change.






